

If there was a theme for the 2023 Matarangi Raterpayers [MRAI] Annual General Meeting it was water and waste. The impact on our community from water related weather events last year was significant especially as the lives of us here on the Coromandel had to also adjust to a challenging post-pandemic environment. In the Matarangi community the MRAI continued to work on the issues which have been mounting up even prior to the Covid outbreak in 2020 and the extraordinary challenges we had following the devastating Cyclones last summer – the Water Treatment Plant Upgrade, Our Storm water issues, and subdivision water storage tanks.

In his Chair's report given to a meeting of over 100 residents gathered at the Dunes this past Monday, Mark Bedford said the MRAI is in good heart with well over 400 members and noted the current estimate of resident population is around 1200. Mark said that MRAI will continue to support all of our local community as they have done for a very long time. "Almost all of our subscription income goes back to community organisations to support their very valuable work. Much of our advocacy work is carried on behind the scenes, and despite the occasional critic we are always beavering away especially as it relates to infrastructure, and as you will see during the AGM discussions, I am sure, the outcomes are not always perfect and we will never be able to meet everyone's expectations."

With respect to the major water related issues in the village - in summary, Council is still trying to reach agreement on the acquisition of the land where the new Water Treatment Plant is situated. A building

consent for the new plant scheduled for December can't be lodged until the TCDC have agreements in place. The new Waste Water Treatment Plant Upgrade is dependent on the new discharge consent, expected to be finalised this year with recent sampling results informing the scope and timeline of the project. With respect to our stormwater issues, these are complex and will take some time to remedy but there is a methodical assessment to the causes and the remedies to prevent recurrence. Mark thanked Grant Short, Brett Houston, Mike Smith for their work in this matter.

Other matters in the Chair's report included the status of the Wetlands, now at the Environment Court and the Bluff Road Connectivity project the MRAI and KRRA are jointly pursuing. Recent weather events have created seven active slips between Matarangi and Rings beach. MRAI, KRRA and the Matarangi Community Trust are advocating strongly for this walk-cycleway track and the TCDC supports this concept. However, Mark warns that until we have accurate costings and geo-tech findings we will need to be patient. MRAI welcomed the establishment of Matarangi Dunecare Group and their work will be vital to help regenerate the dunes along our coast to help protect from long term erosion. MRAI also provided grants to The Ring Beach Wetlands group, Te Rerenga School pump track, and A Taste of Matarangi. Mark thanked the TCDC for their positive relationship and thanked Mayor Len Salt, Bess Kingi, Rehka Percival and Dell Connell for their engagement and attending the AGM.

TCDC Mayor Len Salt in addressing the meeting said 2023 was not an ordinary year for the Thames-

Coromandel District and the effects of Cyclones Hale and Gabrielle will impact the council into the future. "We as a district suffered flooding and erosion across multiple sites. Six metres of rain fell last year when 3.5 metres is a normal year. We had the SH25A closure, plus the Tapu Coroglen as well as the 309 and the Thames Coast."


According to Mayor Salt the next council ten year long term plan, which is now underway will focus on roading, recovery and resilience. Reprioritisation of the Regional Land Transport schedule will see \$811 million for Thames-Coromandel. This is very much needed as historically the regional funding of roading infrastructure has underweighted the requirements of the peninsula over Hamilton and its surrounds. The Mayor correctly inferred that we have been the poor country cousins in this regard and much of the reason why our local roading lacks capacity and resilience is due to this funding bias.

With the revamp of Three Waters underway, Mayor Salt said what happens next is as yet unknown with respect to funding structures and where the TCDC fits inside all of that, either regionally or sub-regionally. Improved solid waste management is on the right path according to Mayor Salt but is still taking time to bed down. It is about reducing the 13500 tonnes to landfill each year and the requirements for waste management compliance that have come down from the Central Government. Council is always on the lookout to improve the way it does things. (Continued on Page 3)

Election 23: Where did the local Vote Go?

The final general election results for the Coromandel electorate were released at the end of last year and were able to give us a picture of how things went amongst the three local booths at Matarangi, Kuaotunu and Te Rerenga.

Though the booth results released only recorded the votes cast on Election Day last October 14th and not the record pre-voting or special votes it did reveal some significant trends in where each of the three communities lean to politically.

The results from those parties in a position to form a government were as follows:

In Matarangi there were 245 votes cast on Election Day with National receiving 114, ACT 44, Greens 26, Labour 24, NZ First 16 and Te Pati Maori 4. There was solid support for ACT amongst the minor parties who gained 17.5% of the vote, double their national average. There was also strong support for National with 46.5% of the vote well above their national average of 38%. The Labour vote in Matarangi simply collapsed with just 10% on the day who were beaten into 4th place by the Greens.

In Kuaotunu there were 227 votes cast with National topping the score sheet with 67, the Greens moving up to second place with a solid 54 votes counted. Labour did better here than in Matarangi with 43 votes, with ACT on 23, NZ First on 21, both roughly matching their results nationwide. There

was also a sole vote for Te Pati Maori however there was a strong trend for Te Pati Maori on the Peninsula in the Tainui Waikato seat. Kuaotunu was a strong patch for the Greens with 23.8% of the vote double their nationwide average of 11.6%.

At the Te Rerenga School booth, there were 54 votes cast with again National toping the poll with 17 votes ahead of NZ First with 11. Labour received 9 votes, the Greens 5, and ACT 4.

Collectively across the 3 local booths we were as a community more favoured towards the centre right parties (NAT, ACT NZF) with 317 votes of the total 526 votes cast on election day. The centre left parties (LAB, GRN, TPM) receiving collectively 165 votes. At the electorate level this centre right block attained 65% of the vote with the centre left block back on 28%, with all others gaining just 7%.

When it came to voting for our Member of Parliament, incumbency is a huge advantage with Scott Simpson receiving 168 votes in Matarangi, 82 in Kuaotunu and 23 in Te Rerenga. Electorate wide Scott achieved a massive 17500 majority with 25000 votes cast for him alone from a total of 47100 votes tallied. It was the 5th straight win for Scott as the MP for Coromandel. If Scott completes his 5th term he will become the longest serving MP to serve the Peninsula surpassing the Hon. Arthur Kinsella (1954–1969). Following the election Scott Simpson was selected to be the Chief Government Whip.

MRAI AGM Continued



In his AGM address the Mayor noted that as a result of recent events there is a cost to living in paradise and that unfortunately like everywhere else around the country that will very likely mean rate rises. However, he was keen to point out that compared to some of the projected rates rises of many local authorities ours will be more moderate, due to the TCDC books being in better shape than many other local authorities. He does not expect us to have rises anywhere near that of Hamilton or Wellington.

"With roading and water infrastructure resilience and recovery, plus maintaining all the other things that the council is legally mandated to carry out under the Local Government Act, it will all cost and it is unavoidable. The Peninsula faces up to an infrastructure deficit, our changing demographics and climate change," said Mayor Salt.

The Matarangi weather summary for 2023 from Grant Archibald's weather station in Puka Cres reveals quite a variable year weather-wise, with the overall theme being rainfall.

In 2023 we had an incredible 2105.6mm of rain with February being the wettest month with 440.8mm alone. More than half of the year's total fell in just 3 months January (310.6mm), February (440.8) and June (316.8mm).

January had the highest average temperature (20.0) and the day with the highest recorded temperature for 2023 was Feb 19th (28.9). Coolest temperature recorded was on Aug 4th

Windiest month during 2023 was January (average 18.9km/hr) closely followed by May (18.7 km/hr). The least windiest month last year was March with an average wind speed of 9.8km/hr. The biggest wind gust recorded was a 101.4 km/hr blast on October 30th.

CORNER PEST

Spiders must be one of the most common pests we get calls about, although mainly due to their unsightly webs covering people's homes. This month however, I would like to focus on between your sheets. Anywhere dark and warm really. a non-web making spider species: the infamous White-tailed spider.

There are two species of White-tailed spiders in New Zealand (one on the north island and the other on the south), although they both originate from Australia and look almost identical. They are easily identified by their dark grey, elongated body and distinctive white patch at the end of their abdomen. Adults will generally range between 1 - 2.5cm in length.

These spiders are nocturnal and active hunters. Their preferred prey? Other spiders mainly! Preferably the grey house spider, but also sometimes their own species and some other insects as well. Their favoured habitat is outside under dry bark and rocks, but they can come into homes looking for prey, respite from hot weather in summer, or a warm, dry place to

with Amy English of Peninsula Pest Services rest in winter. This is why you might find them in the folds of curtains, in discarded clothes on the floor or nestled in

So, if they eat other spiders and insects – why do we all detest them so much? Isn't that a good thing? Well yes, it is, but unfortunately we have all heard stories about nasty Whitetail spider bites. This is somewhat of a misnomer. Yes, they do bite, but generally only when handled or provoked, which can happen accidentally when you find them hiding in your hadsheets or discrete data. bedsheets or discarded clothes. Generally, a White-tail bite will only cause some minor pain and swelling around the site for a few days. In rare cases, some might have a larger reaction to the bite, or develop an infection that causes further issues.

The best thing you can do to minimise the likelihood of White-tails coming into your home is to take away their food source by getting rid of other spiders hanging out on and in your home. If this is something you need help with, please don't hesitate to give us a call.

January 2024 with Alastair Brickell

This is the month of the planets and space stations!

Jupiter remains a brilliant object visible just after dusk in the northeastern sky but is getting ever lower as it moves towards the Sun while much fainter Saturn lies very low in the west but will be very hard to spot and soon becomes lost in the Sun's glare.

The dawn sky early in the month has three more planets on view including elusive Mercury just above the eastern horizon for a while with slightly reddish but much fainter Mars and brilliant Venus lined up above it in that order. They are joined by the Moon in the same line early the month and it can be seen sliding past them from day to day. It is in a bit of a hurry as it has to be back in the same spot in just 28 days as it travels in its orbit around the Earth. We can also watch Venus getting ever closer to Mars from day to day and then moving past it towards the end of the month.

There will be a few Chinese Tiangong and lots of International Space Station (ISS) passes to enjoy this month and on February 9 we can see them both in the evening sky at the same time which is quite rare. As usual, timings may change, especially towards the end of the month, if they have to be moved to avoid space junk. Always best to check the website heavensabove.com for updated timings.

February 4 — The Moon sits just above the claws of Scorpio in the dawn sky with brilliant Venus in Sagittarius and fainter Mars and Mercury below.

February 7 — The thin crescent Moon is just to the left of the spout of the teapot or Sagittarius at dawn with Venus, reddish Mars and Mercury below.

February 8 — The Moon now sits right next to Venus next to the teapot's handle with Mars and Mercury below at dawn. There is a long ISS pass from 6:09am in the SW and another shorter one from 9:13pm in the north after it has completed one orbit of the Earth.

February 9 — The Moon is now very low down at dawn just above faint Mercury. A space station feast today with another two ISS and one Tiangong passes. The first long and bright ISS one will be from 5:20am in the SW and then again from 10:01pm starting just next to Jupiter in the NW and disappearing into the Earth's shadow next to the Southern Cross. This one will be joined by Tiangong from 10:03 in the SW which will also disappear into the same shadow high overhead.

February 10 - Another bright and long ISS pass from 9:13pm in the NW next to Jupiter.

February 11 — Right at sunset we have a minute crescent Moon just to the right of Saturn almost on the western horizon with an ISS pass from 10:02pm in the west.

February 12 — The thin crescent Moon at sunset is now above and to the right of Saturn low in the west in Pisces having moved to the other side of the Sun with a good ISS pass from 9:13pm in the west.

February 16 — The First Quarter Moon is now approaching the Pleiades or Matariki sitting just below and to the left of them.

February 19 — The dawn sky has brilliant Venus just above much fainter and slightly reddish Mars in the east while Mercury has slid below the horizon.

February 25 — We have a short but bright ISS pass from 10:03pm low in the SW.

February 26 — There will be another short but bright ISS pass low in the SW from 9:15pm disappearing into the Earth's shadow just after passing the Southern Cross.

February 27 — Brilliant Venus has now passed Mars low in

February 27 — Brilliant Venus has now passed Mars low in the eastern dawn sky with a short but bright ISS pass from 10:02pm low in the SW.

February 28 - A short but brighter ISS pass tonight from 9:14pm in the SW.

February 29 — Brilliant Venus now lies some distance below slightly reddish Mars very low in the eastern dawn sky with a low ISS pass form 10:02 in the west.

March 1 — We have a long and bright ISS pass from 9:13pm in the west passing through Orion just before disappearing into the Earth's shadow in Gemini.

Conservation Conversations:

2024 Dune Restoration Planning Underway

No cyclones so far in 2024 has ensured a vastly improved start than last year. The 2024 hot and sunny summer with regular heavy rain has meant dune plants have remained green and healthy for longer and dune activities can be focussed on quality and timing rather than getting activities frantically completed in between cyclone events. Some of the August 2023 planted spinifex at Ocean Close have runners over 2m in length which is impressive growth for young plants.

Jo and I have been planning the 2024 Dune care programme along with Andrea Whitehead, Coastal Restoration Coordinator Coastcare. The 2024 coastal restoration plans have been finalised and sent off as funding proposals to various community organisations in Matarangi. We look forward to sharing these with the Matarangi community in the next few months and scheduling in each event in the MDRG calendar.

Local eco-sourcing of dune plants seedheads has been steady starting with the pingao seed in early January followed by the spinifex in mid to late January. Approximately half of all the seed heads you see on the beach are collected by MDRG volunteers, dried and stored for 2025 propagation by Coastlands specialist propagators in Whakatane. All the seed heads have been dried off for a few weeks in this gorgeous sun. Seedheads are huge this year, so hoping this equates to high quality plants to be replanted back along Mercury Bay dunes.

Many thanks to our seed collecting volunteers who have been hard at work in the cooler hours on the Matarangi dunes collecting bags of dune plant seed heads. If you are interested in volunteering for any of MDRG activities, please see the MBP Events Calendar.

Ten Year LTP Journey Starts

The TCDC have started on the next Long Term Plan (LTP) journey, creating a road map for the coming 10 years that will guide council's long-term decision-making with the theme: Towards Resilience: Your Future, Our Commitment. The four key LTP priorities will be; a collaborative district, a vibrant and safe district, a connected and resilient district, and a district with sustainable services and infrastructure.

This planning document will outline all the services and projects that the TCDC is planning, what they're going to cost and how they'll fund them (including what rates increases are likely to be for the next 10 years).

This LTP will be focused on recovery from the extreme weather earlier this year and building resilience into the infrastructure and facilities our Council provides, as well as enabling that same recovery and resilience in our communities.

Council will be asking for the participation and feedback from staff, elected members, iwi, other partners including government agencies, ratepayers and local communities as they move through this process. They'll be seeking more of the public's informal involvement in the coming months, ahead of asking for formal public feedback on their main proposals in March and April 2025.





Lisa-Marie Fitzgerald from Evolving Hearts sat down with Jodie Robertson from Wolf & Phoenix Massage to learn more about her practice, Kansa wand face massage and foot reflexology?
