With strong community spirit and persistence, the case for reinstating the service was carried forward to ensure Coromandel remains accessible and connected. This success owes much to the joint efforts of the Coromandel-Colville Business Association and Thames-Coromandel District Council's Economic Development team, playing pivotal roles in pulling together the information, feedback, and support needed to get the trial service across the line. We also acknowledge and thank Explore Group, who have stepped up and taken on the delivery of the service. It is heartening to know that a New Zealand-owned company has taken charge of this project, recognising the importance of the connection between Auckland and Coromandel. The trial service, which will run through until April, is a vital opportunity for Coromandel. It is

more than just a transport link - it is a gateway that brings visitors, families, and opportunities into our town. Local businesses will benefit, with ferry passengers choosing to dine, shop, and stay here. Accommodation providers, retailers, and hospitality venues all stand to gain from the steady flow of visitors arriving directly into the heart of Coromandel.

The ferry's return is also being celebrated beyond our community. TCDC has entered this initiative into the Economic Development New Zealand (EDNZ) Best Practice Awards in the Collaboration category. This award celebrates outstanding partnerships between two or more organisations that have joined forces to achieve significant positive economic outcomes. The nomination recognises how the combined efforts of council, community, and operators have produced results far exceeding what could have been achieved individually. It highlights the power of strategic alliances in driving growth, prosperity, and resilience.

But the success of this trial does not rest solely on the work already done. Its future depends on us – the local community. To secure the ferry as a permanent service, it is critical that the community continues to support it, spread the word, and encourage visitors to make use of it. Every ticket purchased, every trip taken, helps demonstrate that the service is viable and valued.

The ferry is not just about boosting business; it is about strengthening the lifeline that connects Coromandel to Auckland and beyond. It means easier access for families visiting loved ones, more

options for weekend escapes, and a sustainable transport link that eases pressure on our roads. It also represents resilience – showing how our community, when faced with a challenge, can work together to find solutions and achieve results.

This achievement is a credit to everyone who attended engagement sessions, shared their feedback, voiced their support, and believed in the value of the ferry. It highlights the best of Coromandel: a community that pulls together, values connection, and looks to the future with optimism.

Now, we have the chance to build on this momentum. The ferry's future is in our hands. If we back it, use it, and continue to show how much it matters, we can secure this essential service for years to come.



Explore Group Announce Further Petails about the Coromandel -Auckland Ferry

The service will initially operate an express Friday evening service, as well as Saturday and Sunday departures with plans to increase the schedule with demand.

The journey will take just over two hours and passengers can relax and enjoy the scenic cruise through the eastern Hauraki Gulf onboard Explore's fleet of premium vessels.

"We're really pleased this is happening," says our Council's Economic Development Lead Mitch

"The community has been looking for the ferry service from Auckland to be reinstated for several years now because it's such an important part of the Coromandel's hospitality offering. It's been great to work with Explore Group and the Coromandel Business Association to bring back the ferry connection.

The new service departs Auckland's Viaduct arriving at Hannaford's Wharf and will be met with a shuttle bus connecting passengers onto Coromandel Town.

"We are excited to add this new destination to our schedule and connect Auckland and the Coromandel region," says William Goodfellow, Managing Director, Explore Group.

"It's the next step in expanding our service on the Hauraki Gulf from Tiritiri Matangi in the north to Man O' War, Waiheke and Rotoroa Island in the east. Coromandel is a natural step for us in the Gulf, supported by the local Coromandel community who are passionate about reconnecting their community.

The new service has been long awaited by the local Coromandel community. Coromandel Business Association Chair, Jennifer Ashman says: "The local community is delighted that a ferry service has been reinstated.

"Positive input from the community has demonstrated local demand from businesses, locals and visitors alike and contributed to the successful reestablishment of a service that will be invaluable to connecting our community.'

The reopening of the maritime link has much to appeal to visitors, says Hadley Dryden, General Manager of Destination Hauraki Coromandel.

"The revival of the blue highway is fantastic news. Cruising the islands of the Hauraki Gulf - alongside marine wildlife, past mussel farms, with the Coromandel Ranges and city skyline at either end - is an experience not to be missed. Once aboard, visitors will understand why Hauraki Coromandel is good for your soul."

The Coromandel ferry schedule will commence on Friday 24 October departing Auckland's Viaduct at 4:45pm and arriving at Hannaford's Wharf at 6:45pm. Saturday and Sunday return service will also begin on 25 and 26 October.

Prices for a return trip from Auckland's Viaduct to Coromandel Town (including bus transfer) are: \$135 per adult and \$67.50 per child. There will also be an option for extended transfer to Whitianga: \$185 per adult and \$92.50 per child.

FROM THE MATARANGI HISTORY GROUP FILES



As told by Lindsay Arthur

In the early days of the Matarangi when it still had an airfield, locals could ring up and order a plane for Auckland or the Barrier. Once such family who were flying out of Matarangi ordered a plane to ferry them to Auckland airport. It duly arrived. The gear was loaded and they were ready to head off. However it didn't work out too well.

The few residents who lived here back then were all part of the new Volunteer Fire Brigade, which covered any emergencies. I was at work and got a call to come to a plane crash in the harbour. I asked was there were any casualties? The reply was "No, no one hurt at all." My response was "there's not much use in coming then." I was then advised that maybe I should come and check my yacht, which was moored near the SW approach to the airstrip.

Some back history here. In 1987 I had placed a permanent mooring not far from the end of the jetty. The yacht had a 36' foot mast, regardless of tide direction, the mast it was not too far off to the side of a normal flight path. Before placing the mooring I had checked with a number of pilots who were regularly flying in and they had all thought it was a great reference point when on finals.

So all the while travelling to the crash site I was pondering

just how a pilot might not see the mast or how one might be off course enough to clip it. I well knew it was a fresh NE breeze so all I could think about was this had to be an inbound aircraft. In actual fact it was nothing like this scenario at all.

The plane fully loaded, took off downwind towards the SW with a good NE breeze directly behind it. It had no show getting airborne and ran straight through the fence, ruined a dinghy, bounced about three times on the beach and finished up in the channel right beside the yacht. Fortunately the tide was running in, so the yacht was hanging back. So other than a big fright, a very wet plane and a very embarrassed pilot, no more harm was done.






The September 2015 edition of the Matarangi Beach Paper featured the obituary of Graham Collings written by his wife Margaret, following his passing after battling Parkinson's for some years. Graham and Margaret were members of that exclusive club of people who lived in Matarangi right from the very start.

As 2026 will be the 50th anniversary since the first sections in Matarangi went on the market, having these historical contributions in the MBP about the community and the people who were here at right at the beginning are becoming increasingly important as time moves on. The obituary about Graham's Matarangi life is republished below.

A Matarangi Pioneer



Graham, his wife Margaret and children arrived in Whitianga in early 1969 where he took up the new position of Assistant County Engineer for the Coromandel County Council. When the council decided to appoint a County Planner he was appointed.

He worked closely with the council consultant, Barry (now Sir Barry) Curtis and the owner of the Matarangi spit, Ken Woodhead of Kenwood Properties, hence one of the first roads being named Kenwood Drive. This was at a time when many developers put a road down the beach front and cut up the land for sections with little thought of providing access for the public and reserves.

Although the early development along Kenwood Drive followed the old pattern, Ken Woodhead and the county council wanted to provide a better development giving more beach access and facilities to the section owners. As the spit was largely undeveloped there were a number of objections to the plan, then lengthy and protracted hearings about the desirability of this major project. Eventually the development was approved, at least partly, because this would give a base for people to live and to visit while keeping other areas largely undeveloped to retain the natural beauty of the Coromandel Peninsula.

Around this time the Coromandel County Council merged with the Thames Borough and County Councils to become the Thames-Coromandel District Council. Not wanting to move to Thames, Graham secured a position with Ken Woodhead's company to oversee the Matarangi development and the family moved to Matarangi, living in a small farmer's cottage about 100 metres from the beach at the bluff end. There was one other family living there at the time.

Graham and his wife built their home on the beachfront at the end of Kenwood Drive while the road was still unsealed. They had a bore for water and had to apply to get the rural delivery service extended. Their four children had to be driven out to SH 25 for the school bus and collected again each day.

There was so little traffic at that time that in many places there was grass growing in the middle of the bluff road between the wheel tracks. The very old bridge on the road in from State Highway 25 was rotten so the bluff was the only safe way in, much to the horror of some, especially with a caravan or boat, who started out from Kuaotunu and Rings Beach and found that there was nowhere to turn and no other way out.

Graham's brief was to liaise with surveyors, civil engineers, contractors and the council during the year, preparing a new area of subdivision. He then sold the sections as part of his employment, mostly over summer. Some years people were swarming over the

sections, some coming back to the sales office to buy only to find that their first choice had just been taken. Other years it was quieter but overall there were steady sales and mostly, a new subdivision for the next summer.

One of his other tasks was the design and supervision of the bridge in from SH25 and the roads leading to it. There was then a planting campaign on the bank above the road.

Kenwood Properties Ltd sold Matarangi to a company owned by Rothmans, Matarangi Beach Estates, who undertook the major developments over the next several years.

Apart from the areas being developed, most of the spit was covered in long grass and pine trees which had been planted before Graham became involved. The air strip had been there from its farming days. Sheep needed to be cleared off it if someone wanted to land and going up to the point by vehicle was a rather bumpy slow ride.

Graham walked this rather rough ground with Bob Charles when he came to design the first nine holes of the golf links. They walked around together with Bob spraying the trees that needed to come out for the fairways and greens. He left one tree in the middle of a fairway commenting that people would wonder if it was meant to be there or not. It was later removed. They played the very first 'round' of golf with a member of the Mercury Bay Golf Club, hitting over long grass and fences to where the hole might eventually be.

In 1988 Graham and Margaret moved back to Auckland for work opportunities, but Matarangi has held a very special place in their lives and those of their children who grew up there and a grand-daughter who now lives there. It was with real pride that they looked back at the areas that were developed under Graham's watch and with interest at the developments since.

There are groups of trees, well-grown now, that were planted for developments that didn't happen. There are probably only one or two people left who would know why they are. The pohutukawa in the reserve next to the family home were planted under his supervision and are at last providing the much needed shade. The beach is as beautiful as ever.

In a bold move to increase its funding base, the Coromandel Rescue Helicopter Trust has launched a major new initiative and is now seeking community backing.

In conjunction with New Zealand Rescue, the Trust has ventured into a lottery as it looks to grow the resources to support delivering rescue helicopter services. Trust chairman, Whitianga's John Stephenson, describes the decision to partner with NZ Rescue as a bold shift in a move to secure funding for the trust.

The two-tier lottery is being marketed nationally and provides a range of first-class prizes including a New Age Road Owl Caravan paired with a Land Rover Defender, and the opportunity to own a JB Motorhome 7.8 Queen.

John said under the two-tier approach two lotteries were running with only 6000 tickets available for the JB Motorhome, and 10,000 tickets for the New

Age Road Owl Caravan and Land Rover Defender option. He said tickets sell from \$100.00.

"All ticket sales go towards supporting the Coromandel Rescue Helicopter Trust which ensures that the life-saving emergency services remain available to people both living and visiting our wider region.

"Our trustees were excited when presented with this option and we appreciate being able to partner with NZ Rescue," said John. "We receive wonderful support from many organisations, individuals and groups through fund-raising events, donations and grants – all being highly appreciated.

"Our latest venture enables people to support the trust and the work it undertakes with the chance of winning superb prizes."

John said when considering the prize packages, the trustees felt something that aligned with our region

in being such an attractive holiday destination was appropriate. While the trust does not operate its own helicopters it does have a hanger and base at the Whitianga Airfield. Helicopters service the region from Auckland, Waikato and the Bay of Plenty.

"At the summer peak we can have over 400,000 people around our region and at this time the requirement of rescue helicopter service can quadruple," said John.

"We are a region very reliant on our rescue helicopters; we encourage people to support the lottery so we can continue to return the support when it is most needed."

"I am very proud to have been appointed a Justice of the Peace. I became a JP so I can contribute more to the Matarangi community and New Zealand by providing the kind of support a JP is able to provide," said Ernest.

The Hauraki Coromandel Justices of the Peace Association Inc began as a Thames Branch of the Auckland Justices of the Peace Association in 1958. In 1965, it became an independent association in its own right. The formation of the

independent Hauraki Association was led by Mr Harry Israel, an Auckland Justice, and Mr Lyall Noakes, who became the first Registrar. Mr W.D. (Bill) Hare from Whenuakite was appointed the first President.

Justices of the Peace were active in the Thames area as far back as 1875, during the Gold Rush era. Their role has evolved significantly since then—from dealing with lawlessness to primarily ministerial duties such as witnessing documents, certifying copies, and taking oaths. Today, the Association supports 97 Justices across the Coromandel Peninsula, Thames, Hauraki Plains, Waihi, and Whangamata.

While most focus on ministerial duties, a select few are trained for judicial roles and serve as Issuing Officers or in court.

Omaro Reserve Upgrade - Context, Conundrum, Change, Compromise

Some additional context regarding the Omaro Reserve Upgrade provided by MRMG & MRRAI.

Omaro Reserve Finally Vested to TCDC & Zoned as Recreation Passive Reserve

As a result of the final vesting of land by Winton Investments Ltd to TCDC in 2024, Omaro Reserve can finally undergo an upgrade as a passive recreation reserve. This area has existed for many years in a `grey area' while awaiting completion of sections by the developer.

Omaro Reserve Connectivity & Changes to Shared Space Use

Walkways now link Omaro reserve from the Matarangi shops to the spit. The reserve gets used in new ways by our active community. More people are walking, biking, & dog walking along these connecting paths. Weekends & evenings see more working family use. Extreme water sports dominate windy days. The 5 freedom campers parks often exceeded. This popular shared space has become more frequently used by different sections of our community and year around.

Demographic Shift - Matarangi is Growing, with Increase in Young Families

Matarangi's permanent population has grown from 400 to 1400 residents in 5 years (post Covid). Te Rerenga School (local primary school) has had a 27% increase in students from 82 (2019) to a current roll of 125 students. Completed dwellings in new subdivisions increase each year. Holiday population growth increases year on year. Pressure on the boat ramp due to increased dwellings was reported by the Boating & Fishing Club in 2019 (MBP 118th edition). 6 years on, our population has increased significantly.

Summer Population Surge Causes Infrastructure Strain & Bottlenecks

Matarangi swells from 1400 permanent residents to 10,000 + people. Our small town does not have the roading, parking, water & hospitality venues to cope with population surge easily. Peak demand means bottlenecks everywhere – restaurants & cafes/supermarket/golf course or boat ramp. It's the reality of living & playing in Matarangi over summer & long weekends.

New Boat Ramp Road Wider with Grassed Verges

The new Boat Ramp Road is significantly wider (then the old gravel road) with grass verges allowing vehicles with boats to queue to left of road on verge, allowing 2 clear lane widths for entry / exit. Freedom campers and non-boating vehicles use first exit on left (keeping them away from boat traffic). Other than peak demand usage, traffic flow should not be impeded. Signs and no stopping road marking will indicate queue lane and traffic flow.

Omaro Reserve has been in Community Consultative Phase since March 2023

Community projects are notified to the community through a consultation process. In a March 2023 workshop, the initial concept plan was distributed to 8 key community groups: Matarangi Ratepayers & Residents Association Inc; Matarangi Reserves Management Group; Matarangi Community Trust; Matarangi Dune Restoration Group; Matarangi Boating & Fishing Group; Matarangi Fire Brigade; Iwi (Ngāti Huarere ki Whangapoua Trust) and a family representative was added in 2025. The first TCDC public notification / feedback was via Matarangi Community Face Book page (Share your Vision for Omaro Reserve) in September 2024 and again in September 2025 (Matarangi Omaro Reserve upgrade).

Community Consultation Feedback Requested Change

34 community feedback submissions were received with 100 recommendations in the 2024 community consultation. Family friendly spaces & play areas and safety /accessibility were the most requested submission criteria. Clearly Omaro Reserve is sought particularly by families to be more than boat parking and is used year around, not just peak holiday periods. Omaro Reserve upgrade budget focus

From the initial 2023 community workshop, this project has had a cost-conscious lens. It will not be another Village Green. The upgrade will be staged over many years. Costs will mostly come out of TCDC operational budget expenditure, not additional ratepayers funding. The newly installed public toilet paid for by the MBIE Tourism Infrastructure fund, at no cost to ratepayers.

Rings Beach Wetlands Group Spring Report



It has been a while since I last reported and there has been quite a lot of activity over the last few months in the reserve, with another round of wilding pine removal, on-going trapping work, further development of the trapping infrastructure and ongoing walking track maintenance.

The Predator Free Hauraki Coromandel support team were contracted this round to further the work of wilding pine removal, involving mostly hand sawing and pulling with some felling work where appropriate. Tens of thousands of wilding pines have been removed, and the work will continue. There is certainly no shortage of pine recruitment, with seed apparently being viable for well over a decade!

The long-awaited directional signage being supplied by DOC for the main public walking tracks, is I'm assured to be installed in November, in time for the high season. It will be great to get these signs in to improve safety. I often come across people who have lost the track and are unsure where they should be heading.

Maintenance work will be carried out on the public walking tracks before the main holiday season, as rampant spring growth quickly takes over in places. Trapping work continues of course with numbers starting to increase with warming temperatures and food sources increasing with spring growth.

A survey to monitor Matuku-hūrepo (Australasian Bittern) is taking place in the spring with the main listening dates set for early October when a

region wide survey takes place. Mātātā (Fernbird) populations appear to be doing ok in the main valley wetlands, as well as on the southern side of the reserve. Kiwi are also doing well with multiple birds caught on camera in various locations and heard also during the June listening's and by neighbours of the reserve.

With the development of potential new trap lines happening, the group is on the lookout for new volunteers willing to commit to checking traps and maintaining lines on a regular basis. Some of the lines can be a bit challenging so a reasonable degree of fitness is required. If anyone is able to assist us in this work, it would be very much appreciated!



Multi-use sport facility proposed

Our Council is exploring a proposal to convert one of its Matarangi tennis courts into a multi-use sports facility, providing predominantly for netball and basketball.

The proposal to reduce barriers to be active follows a community survey reflecting strong support for the idea. It also has backing from Sport Waikato, Mercury Bay Netball and Matarangi Residents and Ratepayers Association. Our Council is now holding its own survey to hear what the wider community wants.

Matarangi has six tennis court facilities, three of which are Council-owned. The proposal suggests the Council tennis courts near the entrance of Matarangi.

If approved, the proposed conversion is expected to be part-funded through grants and other fundraising opportunities.

WATER TREATMENT PLANT UPGRADE

Our Council's Matarangi Water Treatment Plant upgrade is nearing completion.

All processing equipment including screens, membrane filters, dosing and UV disinfection have been installed. Electrical and control cable installation is almost complete.

Commissioning processes are expected to start in October and be completed in November with the upgraded plant operational by 1 December.

Omaro Reserve

A brand new two-pan toilet facility is being installed at Omaro Reserve (Matarangi Boat Ramp) to replace the dated existing one. The new facility will be connected to the town wastewater supply and power, providing a muchneeded upgrade for the community.



This project is funded by MBIE through the Tourism Infrastructure Fund, granted at the end of last year.

Please note: the current toilets will be closed until mid-October while works take place. A temporary porta loo will be available on site during construction.





Stargazer Sights October 2025 By Alastair Brickell

The early morning sky has both bright Jupiter and considerably brighter Venus on view much lower down in the east. They are the only things that will remain in view for a short while as the Sun rises and the sky brightens. Saturn is at its closest to us this month and visible all night and also is at its brightest. It looks like a sligh yellowish star but being a planet doesn't twinkle like they do. The Moon can help us locate it while Mercury and fainter Mars put on a nice celestial dance low in the west at dusk. We also have the Orionid meteor shower towards the end of the month and this year a bright Moon will not be getting in the way. We should be able to see about 10-20 fast moving meteors an hour with the best views being after midnight. There will be many International Space Station (ISS) passes to enjoy this month but, as usual, timings may change especially towards the end of the month if it has to be moved to avoid space junk. Always best to check the website heavens-above.com for updated timings.

October 3 - The bright Moon sits to the left of the bright star Fomalhaut after dusk with yellowish and brighter Saturn below both while the ISS makes a long pass from 6:06am in the SW

moving just beside the Southern Cross.

October 4 – The Moon has moved to be in line

with Fomalhaut and is approaching Saturn.
October 5 – The bright Moon now sits just above and to the left of Saturn and from 6:07am in the

SW we have a bright and long ISS pass.

October 6 – The Moon is now just below and to the left of Saturn after dusk and from 5:19am in

the SW there is a bright ISS pass.
October 7 – Saturn now sits well above the Moon with a long ISS pass from 6:08am in the west. October 8 – By the time the Moon rises Saturn is sitting high in the sky above it and we have an early ISS pass from 5:21am in the west.

October 9 – We have from 9:11pm a short but bright ISS pass in the NW.

October 10 – From 8:23pm we have a long bright ISS pass in the NW.

October 11 – The Moon lies just to the right of the Pleiades or Matariki after midnight and we have an ISS pass from 9:12pm in the west.

Rekha Giri-Percival: Delivering Practical Outcomes that Matter to People



Serving as a Mercury Bay District Councillor for the last 3 years has been a privilege for Rekha Giri-Percival. Having served two prior terms on the Mercury Bay Community Board before stepping up to the District Councillor role Rekha believes she has the required experience and local government knowledge to keep working for the Mercury Bay.

Rekha says the highlight has been working directly with our communities — listening, advocating, and helping to deliver practical outcomes that matter to people.

"Establishing local stormwater working groups

across the ward. I advocated for these groups to be set up at Community Board level so residents, staff, and elected members could work together on solutions. They're a great example of how local voices can shape local decisions."

The launch of the coastal restoration initiative. This project will rejuvenate approximately 35 km of coastline from Whangapoua to Whangamata, with Matarangi's dunes among the first to be restored through foredune planting, weed/pest control, and dune reshaping.

While Cyclone Gabrielle was not a highlight, the creation and strengthening of local emergency response groups has been. With Civil Defence support, communities now have trained coordinators and pre-positioned supplies—generators, food, water.

"Just months after being sworn in, we were hit by Cyclone Gabrielle — a major event that damaged roads, isolated communities, and forced Council to shift into emergency response mode. On top of that, high inflation, supply chain disruptions, and changing central government policies created pressure on Council budgets and project delivery."

Looking ahead, Rekha considers that a key challenge will be rates affordability while maintaining essential services.

"Costs continue to rise. Ratepayers are already stretched —I hear that loud and clear. I will keep a tight focus on the basics: roads, waters and waste.

These are the services people rely on most, and they must come first. I will push back on unnecessary spending, advocate for smarter project delivery, and look for efficiencies within the organisation."

Phoenix Pinot Gris 2024 Golden straw in colour with fresh aromas of pear, toasted pine nuts, and Turkish delight . Fresh stone fruit roasted almond flavours mingle with wild herbs.

Field Blend 2023 Boasts delicate aromatics, featuring the scent of fresh cut wild flowers, apricots, and lemon thyme. It has a waxy mouthfeel and a subtle white pepper finish.

Juliet Riesling 2024 Aromas of fresh kaffir lime are beautifully balanced with hints of lemon, Jasmine, hazelnuts and orange blossom.

Boat Launch Trial Successful. Area Remains Pegged **Out for Trialling**

The latest concept plan has a park / launch area for 3 boat trailers. The boat launch / retrieval design is similar to local boat ramps at Robinson Rd & Whitianga boat ramp. A boat launch trial was held on 16th September, with 3 large boats easily reversed into launch position. The proposed design remains pegged out with waratahs so that boatowners can trial the new design over the school holidays/Labour Weekend. Boatowners launch/retrieve boats in `off-peak' periods do not use the loop road, but complete a `U-turn' within the confines of the wider Boat Ramp road.




